

Play Doh Stars


- Mix together some yellow Play Doh (or any other colour - be creative) with glitter, squishing the glitter into the Play Doh with your hands.






Here's a little pneumonic to help children remember the planets in order 'Mercury's Volcanoes Erupt Mulberry Jam Sandwiches Until Noon'.
